What to Put in Your Recycling Bin

Curbside recycling happens once a week on your regularly scheduled trash day. To find more information and a complete list of what you can and cannot put in your recycling bin, visit: https://www.kcmo.gov/city-hall/departments/neighborhoodshousing-services.

Items you cannot recycle curbside:

- Plastic bags
- Styrofoam, including Styrofoam egg cartons
- Motor oil bottles and other automotive product bottles
- Containers for household hazardous material
- Paper towels, tissues or napkins, plates or cups
- Gift wrap
- Photographs, blueprints and hanging file folders
- Bags that contained pet food, fertilizer, charcoal or kitty litter

• Glass (For a monthly fee, residents may contract with outside companies to recycle glass curbside)

Items you can recycle curbside:

- Office paper, junk mail, newspapers and magazines
- Corrugated cardboard
- Carrier stock and chipboard (i.e. cardboard soft drink, beer cartons, cereal and shoe boxes)
- Paper/hardback books
- Plastic bottles with a neck #1 and #2, such as water and soda bottles, milk jugs and detergent bottles. Reattached lids may now be recycled, too.

- Plastic containers #3 thru #7, such as yogurt and margarine/butter tub containers
- Cardboard egg cartons
- Pizza boxes (but not with grease stains or food inside)
- Aluminum cans and other metal
- Aseptic containers (milk, juice and vegetable cartons)
- Clean aluminum foil and foil pans




Bulky Item Pickup

If you receive regular weekly recycling and trash services from the City of Kansas City, your address is eligible to receive bulky item collection services. The city's no-charge appointment-based Bulky Item Collection Program is for disposal of large household items that cannot be handled in the regular weekly trash collection.

- Collections will not be made without an appointment.
- Items must meet guidelines for large item collection (Limit 15 items).

Crime Prevention Tips for Protecting Your Home

Exterior lighting – Keep your front door and porch area well-lit at night. Use motion lights on the sides and rear of homes.

Check door and window locks every night – It's easy to forget which doors and windows have been opened throughout the day in the summer. Make it a habit to check doors and windows every night before bed.

Shrubbery and trees – Keep them trimmed so they don't block the view of doors and windows around your home.

When you leave your home – Leave a few lights on inside as well as a TV or radio. Timers can be connected and scheduled to go on and off at different times if you will be gone for longer periods.

When you leave town – Stop your newspaper delivery, ask the post office to hold your mail and package delivery until you return (visit https://holdmail.usps.com/ holdmail), or ask a trusted neighbor pick up your mail and packages for you.
