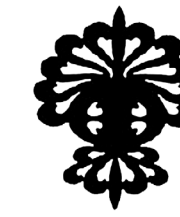

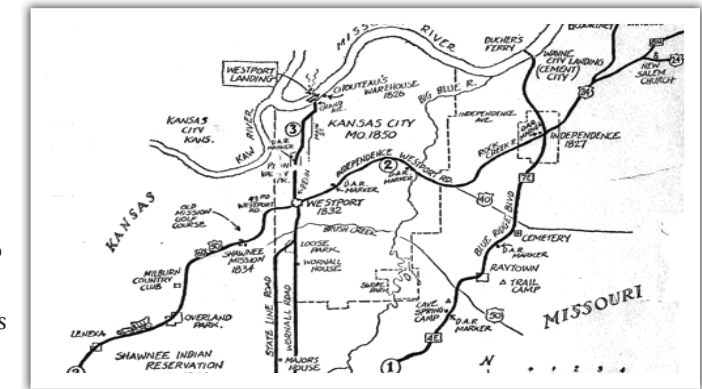


Hyde Park Before the Houses

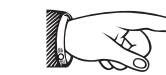

Did you know that our corner of Kansas City is among the oldest and first settled communities in the area?

In 1833, John Calvin McCoy built the first general store and trading post southwest of Independence and three miles south of the Missouri River. He called his store West Port and built it on the Santa Fe Trail where modern day Pennsylvania and Westport Road intersect. The store was a successful trading center for trappers, Indigenous people, and western bound explorers. A village was platted around McCoy's store in 1834. To make his store even more efficient, he cleared a road from the store north to the Missouri River where a rock outcropping on the South bank of the river allowed boats to unload dry goods from St. Louis. This location made John McCoy's Westport Landing the farthest point west that goods from the East could be carried before the river turned to the North. (continued on page 2)

Things really took off with the discovery of gold in California in 1848. The trickle of hunters and trappers became a torrent of fortune hunters eager to strike it rich. Estimates as high as 100,000 people passed by McCoy's store on their way west. Most of them stopped in Westport for provision before the long trek west. Westport incorporated in 1857. All three trails to the West were accessed from the new town: the Oregon Trail, the California Trail, and the Santa Fe Trail. The western bound settlers found grass pastures and natural springs and creeks east of Westport where they could refresh their livestock and provision their wagons.

The trail from Independence entered Hyde Park at about where Troost and Armour are today, and then roughly followed Harrison Parkway south for a few blocks before turning west along what is now Glead Terrace. Cave Spring was located just south of Glead Terrace where it meets Charlotte. The Cave entrance was sealed sometime in the early 20th Century. Early settlers tell stories of using the cave to keep perishable items, and rumors suggest that Jesse James hid in the caves when he passed through the area robbing banks.

Expansion of Westport and Kansas City exploded in 1869 when the first railroad bridge across the Missouri River was built. Westport grew east to Troost and north to 31st Street but was eventually incorporated by Kansas City in 1897 about the same time that South and Central Hyde Park began to be developed for homes.

Mail-in Ballot Info for General Election

Governor Parson signed Senate Bill 631 into law on June 4, 2020, which authorizes all Missouri voters to cast their ballot by mail with notarization for the August 4, 2020 primary election and the November 3, 2020 general election to avoid the risk of contracting or transmitting COVID-19.

All voters can request mail-in ballots from the Kansas City Election Board by visiting in person, calling 816-842-4820 ext. 227, writing a letter, or downloading the application from their website: <https://www.kceb.org/absentee>. Relatives within the second degree (spouse, parents, and children) may complete a mail-in ballot application, in person, on behalf of the voter who wishes to vote using a mail-in ballot. Mail-in voting applications must be submitted only in person or by mail to :

Once an application is received, a ballot will be mailed to the voter within three business days. If you wish to vote by mail, the deadline to submit your application for a mail-in ballot is October 21, 2020.

Voters are eligible to vote absentee without notarization by mail or in person if they fall into either of these two categories, 1) are incapacitated or confined due to illness; 2) have contracted coronavirus this year or you are at risk for contracting it due to any

one of the following: 65 years of age or older, chronic lung disease or asthma, immunocompromised status, diabetes, chronic kidney disease or are undergoing dialysis, liver disease, currently reside in a long term care facility. Absentee ballots may be requested in person up until the day before election day.

General Election Information:

The last day to register for the General Election is October 7, 2020. You can register to vote online at <https://www.kceb.org/voters/> register, or by mail or in person at the Kansas City Election Board Office at 30 W. Pershing Rd, Suite 2800. The General Election will be held November 3, 2020 with polls open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Mail-in ballots must be notarized, returned by mail in the provided envelope, and received by the closing of the polls on election day November 3, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. Absentee ballots without notarization may be returned in person or by mail. Due to the potential delays with the mail delivery, be sure to mail your ballot early. In order for mail-in ballots to be counted, they must be received by the closing of the polls on election day November 3, 2020 at 7:00 p.m.

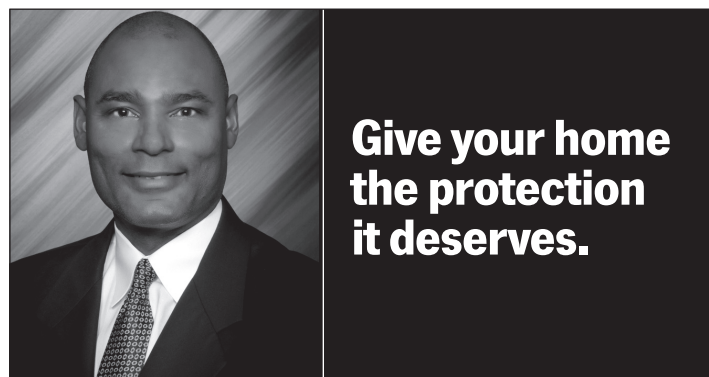

Acceptable Forms of Voter ID

On election day, show one of the forms of acceptable ID and sign to obtain your ballot:

- ID issued by the state of Missouri, an agency of the state, or a local election authority of the state;
- ID issued by the United States government or agency thereof;
- ID issued by an institution of higher education, including a university, college, vocational and technical school, located within the state of Missouri; or
- A copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government check or other government document that contains the name and address of the voter.

If you do not possess any of these forms of identification, but are a registered voter, you may cast a provisional ballot. Your ballot will count if: (1) you return to your polling place on Election Day with a photo ID; or (2) the signature on your provisional ballot envelope is determined by your local election authority to match the signature on your voter registration record.

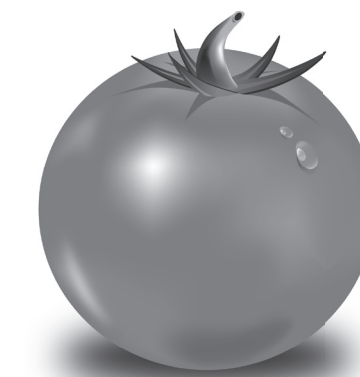
