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AFTER: The picture from today is essentially the same. Most of the old elms have died and new city trees are just in the parking. The parked cars are newer and the roadway is blacktop. The porch itself has changed, with brick and stone replacing the old wood pillars and railings. It is still a nice place to spend a warm evening.

BEFORE: Here is the view from the front porch of 3516 Harrison Boulevard. This picture dates from the early 1920s. Some of the things to notice are the double row of elm trees on either side of the sidewalk, the relatively hard roadway service of oiled macadam, the wicker furniture, and the awnings on most of the West-facing windows and porches across the street.





AFTER: The first thing you notice in this photo is a lot S more trees, but they seem to be mostly in the yards and not on the parkings. The street is now one-way, has a stop sign, and more cars parked on the roadway. Streetlights have been added, but telephone poles have been removed from the East side of the street. The curb is cut for wheelchair access and a more modern fire hydrant is present. I hope people and children are still enjoying the front porches up and down the block.

BEFORE: The corner of Campbell and 43rd Street looking south to the West. The year is 908, shortly after the homes were built in 1905. Unlike the boulevards, the city trees are only in the parking. In the 2nd house, you can see a woman sitting on the porch and two children on the steps. Another woman appears to be reading or doing needlework in the 4th house. Among the great things about Hyde Park is the unchanging nature of the area and the community spirit that is encouraged by the front porches and the walkability of the neighborhood.

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Hyde Park Before and After

(Pat Alley, Hyde Park Historian) Some parts of Hyde Park and the surrounding area have changed completely over the years, while others look almost as they did when the area was first developed. In this issue we will take a look at some that have not changed much and one building in need of demolition or revitalization.



AFTER: Today the property is speculated to be a part of the Troost [4] Village redevelopment project by Compass Resources and Pendulum Studio. Their proposal for the building includes affordable housing units, Airbnb units, and a business and study center.



BEFORE: This undated postcard shows the Thornton & Minor Hospital. The Thornton & Minor clinic bought the Lucerne apartment hotel in 1949 and converted it into a 300-bed hospital specializing in rectal and colonic diseases, according to the postcard. The hospital merged with McCleary Clinic and moved to Excelsior Springs in 1957. In 1958 the building was bought by the Veterans Administration for their regional offices, and in 1966 they converted it into a veterans nursing home.

The building originally opened in 1913 as the Belmont Apartment Hotel. The architect was Grant Middaugh and the builder was George L. Brown & Son. Initially, most of the residents were families renting by the year. The hotel provided lounges for socializing and private parlors for receiving guests. Laundry service, room service, and housekeeping were also available. Residents took their meals in a formal dining room on the second floor with two private dining rooms and a larger banquet room adjacent. Other amenities included a smoking room, a billiards room, and a beauty parlor. Shortly after opening the hotel, owners were sued by a smaller hotel with the same name located on 9th street. The case was settled when the Belmont on Linwood changed its name to the Hotel Lucerne.
