Hyde Park will host its 34th Historic Homes Tour on Saturday, October 1, 2022. The tour will feature six historic homes, a couple of which have never been on tour before.

The old Rockingham Academy for Girls at 4343 Campbell, once a derelict structure jammed full of items, is now a renovated sprawling Shirtwaist featuring a wraparound porch, breakfast porch, boutique style carriage house, restored original millwork, and more. Joan Crawford's bedroom on the third floor is must-see.

4346 Harrison is a brick and stone masterpiece, thoughtfully updated by the current owners, while retaining the original, unique millwork throughout the house. The home is a blend of old and new with updated finishes and fixtures, as well as a large kitchen, with a huge center island, built for entertaining, anchoring the room.

Stepping into 2 Janssen Place will take you back to an era of opulence and grace. The home has been carefully restored and features over nine different varieties of wood millwork, period reproduction wallpapers, original and antique lighting throughout, unique antique furniture throughout, and an updated kitchen and family room area for today's living. The

carriage house is a backyard getaway with two bedrooms, a living area, and a coffee deck.

The stately Craftsman at 3341 Campbell showcases a perfect blend of preservation with updates for modern living. The Craftsman boasts a unique statement piece staircase upon entry, original millwork throughout, carefully preserved original windows, a modern kitchen layout with island and mud room, and a completely renovated primary bedroom suite on the third floor with dual closets, sitting area, bathroom, and private sleeping area. The unique antiques and decor throughout the house are not to be missed!

Stepping into 819 E 31st Street will transform you into a space with soaring ceilings and grand scale. This live workspace features over 12,000 square feet including an entire level for loft style living with a primary bedroom suite, a guest suite, an open floorplan perfect for parties, and an elevated deck area. The first floor is dedicated to work and hobbies and features an office, a workshop where the owner restores vintage cars (he's currently working on an old Jaguar and Ford Bronco), a golf simulator, a 3-5 car tandem garage, and loads of space for work equipment.

The tour committee plans to steer patrons toward our wonderful neighborhood and Midtown businesses for shopping and eating. Between established and new businesses tour patrons will get an entirely new experience on this year's Hyde Park Homes Tour being able to both tour homes and visit neighborhood eateries and shops. End of an Era

We are no longer meeting at Central Presbyterian Church

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association has held monthly general meetings in the Central Presbyterian Church at Campbell and Armour since we first organized in the early 1970s. The Church back then graciously offered their space for meetings in the belief that our efforts to organize and promote the neighborhood was good for the residence as well as the Church. That era of mutual support has ended. The Church notified the board last week that starting in September we would be charged a rent of \$900 for the rest of 2022 and escalating yearly to \$3,000 a year by 2026. They also will require an additional charge if we need one of their larger rooms to accommodate bigger crowds.


The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association has an operating budget of approximately \$10,000 a year, primarily from dues. Over half of that is dedicated to printing and distributing the Hyde Parker, Insurance, and other administration expenses. This year the rest of the budgeted is for publicity, cleanup

(dumpsters), neighborhood plantings, garage sale, community sponsorships and social events (like last month's ice cream social). If we agreed to Central's rent demands we would need to severely limit our operating budget.

For these reasons the board has determined that it is no longer in the best long-term interests of the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association to meet at the Central Presbyterian Church. We are in need of your help finding a new place for the general meetings, which is usually about 35 people, but can expand to 60 or more when a controversial issue is before us (like property tax assessments). We presently meet every other month. We also will need to find a home for the Hyde Park stuff. We store signs, banners, old files and records, and unsold merchandise in a closet at the church. Probably a space about 6x8 should be sufficient for that. The board also meets monthly at the church, but because that meeting usually runs to only a dozen people, we think that finding a place for the board will not be difficult.
